# Pride & Pragmatism: The Flawed Leadership of Gideon Judges 8:22-35 / Sunday, July 12, 2015



**Introduction:** Gideon's failures emphasize the shortcomings of human leadership, but point forward to the perfection of the ultimate Savior, Jesus Christ.

Two failures that demonstrate Gideon's flawed leadership:

### Failure #1: Gideon's Semi-Refusal of a Royal Dynasty Was Rooted in Pride.

How did Gideon live like a king?

- Accumulated great wealth (v. 26)
- Made an ephod to consult God (v. 27)
- Had seventy sons (v. 30)
- Established a large harem (v. 30)
- Named a child "My Father is King" (Abimelech, v. 31)

#### **Two Potential Sources of Pride Among Believers:**

- Substantial Success
- Significant Sacrifice

## Failure #2: Gideon Established A Spiritual Center Based On Pragmatism.

What is the ephod and why is it significant? (Exodus 28:3-14)

- The spiritual significance of the ephod was consecration before God.
- The **practical purpose** of the ephod was to gain revelation or insight from God.

Walking with the Spirit brings joy, victory and peace, but is experienced most profoundly in the drudgery of the daily living! (Galatians 5:25)

- **Gideon's failures put every leader on notice** for the idolatry of achievement, power and approval. **Scripture:** 1 Corinthians 10:12-14)
- Gideon's failures point forward to Jesus.
