

Sermon Title: "Fractured Church"
Scripture: 1 Corinthians 1:10-17

Introduction:

The potential for division is all around, but true unity is found in the fellowship believers share in Christ. (Psalm 133; 1 Corinthians 1:9; 10:17; 12:12)

1. Paul emphatically appealed for unity. (v. 10)

• Being "of the same mind" speaks to the power of observation and the word "judgment" speaks to the forming of an opinion.

Is division ever necessary? (1 Corinthians 5:11-13; 11:19; Titus 3:10; 2 Thess. 3:6, 14)

2. Paul clearly identified the disunity. (v. 11-12)

- The report to Paul was not gossip for he had cause, concern and authority to address the problem. (1 Corinthians 1:1; 2 Corinthians 11:28)
- In their observations of Paul, Apollos, and Cephas, the believers in Corinth formed differing opinions, resulting in quarreling factions. (Titus 3:2)

3. Paul thoroughly undermined the disunity. (v. 13-16)

- Do not confuse diversity with division. (Eph. 4:11; 1 Cor. 12:12)
- Do not forget that Christian teachers merely proclaim what Christ has already purchased. (1 Cor. 1:23; 2:2)
- Do not substitute allegiance to Christ (and His church) with loyalty to people. (Matt. 28:19; Acts 2:38; 10:48; 19:5)

Conclusion: (v. 17)

Only the cross of Christ provides the power to save and unify the church. (v. 18)

- Why was the report to Paul from Chloe's people not gossip?
- How is Paul's appeal to be of one mind and judgment different from demanding conformity?
- How can diversity be used to cause division within the church?
- In what ways do we exalt teachers over the work of Christ?
