

Sermon Title: "When Saints forget their Past"

Scripture: 1 Corinthians 6:1-11

INTRODUCTION

Note: The church is a "called out" community, a "redeemed" community of brothers and sisters in Christ who have the wonderful privilege and responsibility to glorify God <u>together</u> as they love and care for one another.

I. REMEMBER WHO YOU WERE... REMEMBER WHO YOU ARE!

1 Corinthians 6:1, 5a -

A. Personal arguments and vindictive disputes can <u>ruin</u> our testimony and our fellowship.

Note: Instead of going to court, Paul urged and expected them to handle these matters "in house"!

Clarification #1 - These verses are not a "slam" on any and every judicial system!

Clarification #2 - We need to understand the difference between a 'sin' and a 'crime'.

Romans 13:3-7 -

1 Corinthians 6:2-6 -

B. We must remember both our glorious future and our present blessings!

Paul's Point: One day you'll help Christ rule the <u>universe</u>; surely you can settle some minor disputes!

1 Corinthians 6:7-8 -

Note: Before pursuing legal action, we must consider what is in the best interest of the Gospel!

Matthew 5:43-45 -

Note: As believers, we must accept the fact that in this sinful world, we won't get "perfect justice".

Romans 12:19-20 -

Note: We don't ever want to become so preoccupied with our personal rights that we lose sight of primary <u>responsibilities</u>.

Galatians 2:20; 1 Corinthians 6:19b-20 -

1 Corinthians 6:9-11 -

C. To grow in grace and Christ-likeness, we must remember our redeemed, grace-filled past!

Note: Paul underscores the radical and <u>destructive</u> nature of sin, all sin and all kinds of sin!

- "the sexually immoral" -
- "idolaters" -
- "adulterers" -
- "men who practice homosexuality" -
- "thieves" -
- "greedy" -
- "drunkards" -
- "revilers" -
- "swindlers" -

"And such <u>were</u> some of you. But you were <u>washed</u>, you were <u>sanctified</u>, you were <u>justified</u> in the name of the <u>Lord Jesus Christ</u> and by the <u>Spirit of our God</u>." (1 Corinthians 6:11)

Note: Knowing Jesus (being washed, sanctified, justified because of His redeeming work) ALWAYS results in life <u>change</u> and transformation!

Note: You, who have been forgiven so much and now possess such a glorious salvation (being washed, sanctified, justified!), how can you not forgive and show <u>mercy</u> to those who offend you?

Questions for Further Study, Reflection, and Application...

- 1. What is the root problem that Paul addresses in 1st Corinthians 6:1-11?
- 2. Why would Paul expect for believers to be able to resolve personal grievances "in house"?
- 3. How do disagreements and lawsuits between believers effect our testimony before the world?
- 4. Why does Paul, within the context of disagreements and lawsuits, remind the Corinthians of who they used to be and what Jesus has done for them?
- 5. Are you wrestling with any disagreements or grievances with another believer? How can you work to resolve that in a way that demonstrates grace and promotes unity and fellowship in the body?
