

Sermon Series: The Victory of Christmas

Sermon Title: "The Victory of Compassion Over Self-Absorption"

Scripture: Philippians 2:1-11 Pastor Stephen Schultze Sunday, December 18, 2022

Who are you living for? (V. 1-2; James 4:1-3; 2 Corinthians 5:14-15; Luke 9:23-26)

1. *Christmas is a reminder to wake up from our self-absorption and to reflect the heart of Christ. (V. 3-4)

*Christmas – The celebration of the incarnation (the coming of Jesus Christ in the flesh from heaven to earth).

- Biblical compassion is more than sympathy and pity. It is an active expression of love that moves to meet the true needs of others. (James 2:14-17)
- 2. Christmas calls us to *consider the magnitude of the compassion of Jesus, the greatest compassion ever displayed. (V. 5-8)

*consider – to think upon; to be drawn towards

- A infinitely humble compassion. (Luke 2:16; Matthew 11:29-30)
- A divinely purposeful compassion. (Galatians 4:4-5; 1 John 4:9-10, 14)
- A immeasurably costly compassion. (Romans 8:31-32; Luke 12:22-34)
- 3. Christmas provides an(other) opportunity to magnify Christ's compassion as we recognize the vastness of our need. (V. 9-11; John 1::14; Romans 5:12 Romans 6:23)

Questions for Further Study, Reflection, and Application...

- 1. In what ways have you been self-absorbed rather than compassionate this year?
- 2. How does Christmas provide an opportunity to "wake up" to compassion?
- 3. How does the compassion of Christ lead you to humility? How does it bring you encouragement and comfort?
- 4. Why would we claim that Jesus' compassion is the greatest compassion ever displayed?
- 5. What is/are the purposes of God's compassion? How is Christmas as much like D-Day as it is a birthday celebration?
- 6. How can we best magnify Christ's compassionate incarnation? How will everyone ultimately magnify Christ?
