INTRODUCTION

"...it is my eager expectation and hope that <u>I will NOT be at all ashamed</u>, but that with <u>full courage</u> now as always <u>CHRIST will be honored in my body</u>, whether BY LIFE <u>or</u> BY DEATH. For to me <u>to live IS CHRIST</u>, and <u>to die IS GAIN</u>." (Philippians 1:20-21)

Background #1: Smyrna was a very large city (with possibly people living there).
Background #2: Smyrna was famous because it is reported to be the birthplace of
Background #3: Smyrna has a long and interesting history. It was founded in about 1,000 B.C., it was destroyed in 600 B.C., but was then by one of Alexander the Great's generals.
Background #4: Smyrna gets its name from one of its chief exports,
Background #5: Within Smyrna there was a sizable population.
Background #6: Smyrna was an important city in establishing, furthering, and promoting the idolatrous, Roman, imperial
Background #7: In the midst of such hostility, idolatry, and "in-your-face" aggression, Christ's Church IS victorious; true, saving does NOT fail.

I. DEITY CLARITY STABILITY IN ADVERSITY VICTORY
Revelation 2:8 -
DIVINITY - As God, Creator, and Conqueror of death, Jesus guarantees for His people!
Isaiah 44:6
Revelation 2:9 -
CLARITY - Though believers may look to be poor and beaten down, we are in fact!
Note: In verse 9, when Jesus uses the word "your", it is a "your" referring not to the church in general but to each, individual believer.

Revelation 2:10a -
STABILITY IN ADVERSITY - Have no fear because Jesus is and refining our faith.

VICTORY - Those who die without Christ will rise to die again, but those who conquer (those who are
