INTRODUCTION

Five themes that "run" throughout this chapter:

1) The Sovereignty of God: God has the right to do all that He pleases, and He is <u>right</u> when He does all that He pleases!

(Psalm 115:3)

2) The Stubborn, Foolish, Hardened Human Heart: Left to ourselves, dead in our sin, apart from the grace of God, we will defiantly and suicidally <u>hate</u> and "shake our fist" at God!

(Romans 1:24-25)

3) The Sowing and Reaping Principle: God is perfectly just and righteous in all His decisions!

(Galatians 6:7-8)

4) The Magnitude, Breadth, and Intensity of God's Actions: The words "great" and "loud" appear repeatedly in the context of these <u>worldwide</u> judgments.

(John 3:19)

5) The Zeal and Love of God for His People: It is crystal clear that God's people are NOT the target of His wrath and judgment; God fully intends to care for and to <u>encourage</u> them.

(1 Thessalonians 5:9 and Romans 8:1 and Revelation 16:1)

I. THE FINAL SEVEN BOWLS OF GOD'S RIGHTEOUS WRATH

Revelation 16:2 -

Bowl #1 - Painful Sores: Those who took the mark of the beast are now "<u>marked</u>" by God. (Job 2:10 and 1 Peter 5:6-7)

Revelation 16:3 -

Bowl #2 - The Sea Destroyed: God vividly and powerfully displays the effects of sin in creation.

Revelation 16:4-7 -

Bowl #3 - Rivers and Springs Turned to Blood: God's wrath is always just and appropriate.

(2 Corinthians 5:21)

Revelation 16:8-9 -

Bowl #4 - The Scorching Sun: The sinful, hardened heart would rather <u>curse</u> than repent.

Revelation 16:10-11 -

Bowl #5 - Intense Darkness: God exposes the kingdom of the beast for what it really is.

Revelation 16:12-16 -

Bowl #6 - The River Dries and The "Frogs" are Released: God is "setting the stage" and preparing the way for the <u>destruction</u> of His enemies.

Revelation 16:17-21 -

Bowl #7 - The Final Outpouring of Wrath: God pronounces the <u>completion</u> of His judgments as this last expression of wrath is poured out on the earth.

(John 19:30)
