Title: A Sobering Start **Text:** Judges 1:1-36



INTRODUCTION

Theme Verse: "In those days there was NO <u>KING</u> in Israel. Everyone did what was right in his <u>own</u> eyes." (Judges 21:25)

"I will sprinkle clean water on you, and you shall be clean from all your uncleannesses, and from all your idols I will cleanse you. And I will give you a new heart, and a new spirit I will put within you. And I will remove the heart of stone from your flesh and give you a heart of flesh. I. A SOBERING START

Judges 1:1 -

1) Joshua has died and so the people rightly seek the wisdom and direction of God!

(Deuteronomy 6:4-5, 6-7a, 12, 18-19 and 1st Corinthians 10:11)

Judges 1:1-7 -

2) Initially, we see success! The tribes are working together to follow God's instruction!

(Galatians 6:7-10)

Judges 1:8-18 -

3) Victory and blessing belongs to the Lord! So, follow the Lord wherever He leads!

(Proverbs 3:5-7)

Judges 1:22-26 -

4) This is not "Mission Accomplished!"; this is "Mission Compromised!"

(Matthew 6:24)

Judges 1:27-36 -

5) Praise the Lord! This is not primarily a book about Israel but about God!

"Trust in the LORD with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will make straight your paths.

Be not wise in your own eyes; fear the LORD, and turn away from evil."

(Proverbs 3:5-7)
