INTRODUCTION

Cast of Characters:

- (1) JABIN: The King of Canaan... a bad guy!
- (2) SISERA: The Captain/General over Jabin's army... also a bad guy!
- (3) DEBORAH: A Prophetess, A Woman of Faith & Courage, like a Mother in Israel!
- (4) BARAK: Called to Lead the Armies of Israel; A Man of (hesitant) Faith.
- (5) HEBER: A Kenite; Kenites were Neutral (like Switzerland, at peace with everyone).
- (6) JAEL: Heber's Wife; Good? Bad? Let's let the text decide!
- (7) YAHWEH: The True King; Glorious & Sovereign Over ALL Things (War & Weather)!

I. THE PROVIDENCE, POWER, AND POETRY OF DELIVERANCE

A. Danger, Distress, Disobedience, Disaster (Judges 4:1-3 and 5:6-11)

Note: God desires wholeness, integrity, inward renewal, comprehensive <u>love</u> for Him!

(Proverbs 26:11; Micah 6:8; 1 Timothy 1:5)

B. The Wise Woman and The Hesitant Hero (Judges 5:7 and 4:4-9)

Note: It's not ultimately the presence of Deborah (or any godly person) but the presence of <u>God</u> that is essential!

(1 Thessalonians 4:3-4; Hebrews 11:32; 2 Timothy 4:16-17)

C. The Tribes of Israel: Some Strong and Some Spineless (Judges 4:10 and 5:12-18)

Note: It's sad (a tragedy!) whenever <u>love</u> and mutual care/concern is lacking.

(1 Corinthians 12:26)

D. God Delivers His People and Destroys His Enemies (Judges 4:11-24 and 5:19-31)

Note: When the time came, Jael chose to "side" with God and His people, and she is blessed because of it! Sisera and Jabin, on the other hand, show the horrible <u>destruction</u> and the utter futility that comes from opposing God.

E. God: Worthy of Worship (Judges 5:1-5)

Note: This book wasn't written for the dead but for the living, to inspire faith, love, and worship.

Questions for Further Study, Reflection, and Application...

- 1. What is so unique about Judges chapter 5? Why is this song included in Scripture?
- 2. According to Judges 4:1, Israel ran back to sin/idolatry once Ehud died. Why did they do that?
- 3. What good/godly character qualities do you see in Deborah and Barak? Anything that isn't good?
- 4. How did the different tribes respond to the call to come and assist in the battle?
- 5. How do these chapters illustrate the trustworthiness of God and the foolishness of opposing Him?
