The Roots of Team Ministry: Biblical principles and practices.

- * Team ministry is not specifically **prescribed** but frequently **described** in Scripture.
- The principle. We are designed for togetherness. (Proverbs 18:1; Ecclesiastes 4:9-12)
- The principle in practice:
 - Christ sent the 12 disciples out "two by two" (Mark 6:7; Luke 10:1)
 - The Apostle Paul was clearly committed to team ministry. (Romans 16:3, 9; 2 Corinthians 1:24, 8:23; Philippians 2:25; 4:3; Colossians 4:10-11; Thessalonians 3:2)

The Heart of Team Ministry: Collaboration in Christ

- 1. Shared Burdens and Sympathy (Philippians 2:19-20; 2:26-27)
- 2. Prayer for and with One Another (1 Thessalonians 5:25; 2 Thessalonians 3:1)
- 3. Expressing Affection and High Regard (1 Timothy 1:2; 1 Corinthians 4:17)
- 4. Sharing Ministry Updates and Encouraging Reports (1 Thessalonians 3:6-7)
- 5. Correcting and Challenging in Love (Galatians 2:11-14)

The Benefits of Team Ministry: Healthy hearts, relationships, & fruit.

Benefit #1: Team ministry prioritizes "being" before "doing."

• Luke 10:38-42: 1 Peter 5:5b-6: 1 Corinthians 15:10

Benefit #2: Team ministry thrives on mutual reliance.

• Matthew 20:28; Philippians 2:3b-4

Benefit #3: Team ministry provides a framework for healthy discipleship & effective ministry.

Mark 3:14

"Don't do anything by yourself when you can do it with someone else." (E. Stanley Ott)

The "With Me" principle is fundamentally about life-on-life discipleship.

- 6. How would you evaluate your own connection to a team within the church, and what might God be inviting you to adjust or lean into more deeply?
