Title: The Mind of Christ (Part 2)

Text: Philippians 2:5-11



INTRODUCTION

"The grandeur of this passage can easily cause one to forget why it is here." (Gordon Fee)

Note: Paul lays out the deity, humanity, humility, majesty, and sovereignty of Jesus in order to cultivate, develop, and sustain (within us!) the mind of Christ!

Philippians 2:5-11

I. JESUS' DEITY, HUMANITY, HUMILITY, MAJESTY, SOVEREIGNTY

Philippians 2:6 -

DEITY: Jesus did not exploit His equality with God for selfish purposes.

(Hebrews 1:3-4; John 1:1, 14; John 17:4-5; 2 Corinthians 8:9)

Note: The Greek word translated as "grasped" describes taking, seizing, or grabbing hold of something for personal advantage! Jesus did not do that!

Philippians 2:7 -

HUMANITY: In His incarnation, Jesus emptied Himself and became a <u>servant</u>.

(Hebrews 2:17-18; Galatians 5:13-14)

Note: Jesus added humanity to His deity so that He could <u>serve</u> us by doing for us what we could never do for ourselves — that is, fulfilling perfect righteousness and dying in our place for our sins as our representative.

Philippians 2:8 -

HUMILITY: Jesus purposefully submitted Himself to an excruciating, <u>sacrificial</u> death.

(Matthew 27:45-46; 2 Corinthians 5:21; Romans 10:9-11; John 10:17-18)

Philippians 2:9 -

MAJESTY: The Father has exalted Jesus to the <u>highest</u> degree possible!

(Matthew 23:12; James 4:10; 1 Peter 5:6)

Philippians 2:10-11 -

SOVEREIGNTY: Every knee will bow and every tongue will confess that JESUS IS LORD... all to the glory and praise of the Father!

(1 Timothy 6:15)

Questions for Further Study, Reflection, and Application...

- 1. How does Philippians 2:6-11 reveal the mind of Christ? What do we learn about Jesus?
- 2. What should we do? How should we think after studying a passage like this?
- 3. Why is it so hard for us to accept that humility and service are the path to joy and glory?
- 4. Why is the Lordship of Jesus so strong emphasized in this passage? How does this reality produce both encouragement and conviction?
- 5. Is Jesus, indeed, your Lord? How do you know? What evidence do you see?
